TPL sees first-hand the growing economic, educational and social inequality between those in our city who have computers and online access, and those who do not. We live in an increasingly digital world where essential daily tasks take place online, which is why the Library is committed to breaking down barriers for anyone who faces challenges in accessing a computer and Wi-Fi; especially youth, newcomers, seniors, Indigenous peoples and low-income residents who are among the most-impacted groups.

Introducing Toronto Public Library's Internet Connectivity Kit Program

This new initiative, launched in Spring 2020 in the early days of the pandemic, provides some of our city's most vulnerable residents, with a free laptop and Wi-Fi hotspot, which they can keep, plus a 2-year unlimited data plan.

The facts about Internet access



A Nordicity survey of Ontario public library customers showed that 56% who used technology services at a public library would not otherwise have had access to those services, with Internet access being the most used service.



The latest CRTC data reports 31% of Canadian households living on low incomes do not have home Internet access.



The United Nations found that half of all students around the world – nearly 830 million – don't have access to a computer. More than 40% don't have Internet access at home.
